Persons with Perceptual Disabilities

"perceptual disability" means a disability that prevents or inhibits a person from reading or hearing a literary, musical, dramatic or artistic work in its original format, and includes such a disability resulting from:

- (a) severe or total impairment of sight or hearing or the inability to focus or move one's eyes,**
- (b) the inability to hold or manipulate a book, or**
- (c) an impairment relating to comprehension. An impairment is defined as any loss or abnormality of psychological, physiological, or anatomical structure or function.**
